n=1,531 Likely Voters in Cottonwood Heights
Online interviews fielded June 21-July 1, 2016
Margin of error +/-2.5

For this survey 1,531 Cottonwood Heights residents were sampled from the state's file of active registered voters in Cottonwood Heights (see sampling details below). Sampling error is only one possible source of error in survey research. Results can also be affected by measurement error (e.g. question wording and question order), coverage error (e.g. counting as "likely voters" survey respondents who will not vote), and non-response error (e.g. the people who responded to the survey are systematically different from people who refused or were not reachable).

Residents were sampled to participate in the survey and invited via email as well as postal mail invitation to ensure maximum coverage. Data have been analyzed to ensure that the demographics of survey respondents are representative of the population of Cottonwood Heights.

If our biggest crime statistic is burglary and theft, shouldn't they be more worried about doing patrols and investigating thefts? Also, when statistics on the Pentagon's 1033 program were released, I noticed our dept. got a number of M-14 assault rifles, and from citizen Drew Begley's Pinterest, it looks like we have at least one with the SOCOM sniper package for a SWAT team. Again, we don't have a lot of violent crime, are we expecting a riot outside Market Street Grill because they ran out of oysters or something? Our worst violent crime statistics were rape and assault, which were still pretty below the city average. Neither of these is more effectively policed with a SWAT program. It seems like we're over prepared for the wrong crimes and under prepared for the crimes we actually have. If we're trying to save money, maybe we should look into spending our law enforcement dollars more efficiently, maybe outsource violent crimes to Unified so we can focus in on what our citizens actually deal with. I like that we do our court system through Holiday's justice court, this seems like an effective use of tax dollars by sharing facilities. It's just that after the Terracare debacle, it seems an awful lot like we're saving money by cutting the wrong things while we ignore cost savings we could realize by more efficiently managing the city.

1. Fiscal...we don't need our own police force or road crew. We could contact with the county for less money. 2. Political interference... I don't like the mayor and police conspired to put the Canyon Inn out of business.

If our biggest crime statistic is burglary and theft, shouldn't they be more worried about doing patrols and investigating thefts? Also, when statistics on the Pentagon's 1033 program were released, I noticed our dept. got a number of M-14 assault rifles, and from citizen Drew Begley's Pinterest, it looks like we have at least one with the SOCOM sniper package for a SWAT team. Again, we don't have a lot of violent crime, are we expecting a riot outside Market Street Grill because they ran out of oysters or something? Our worst violent crime statistics were rape and assault, which were still pretty below the city average. Neither of these is more effectively policed with a SWAT program. It seems like we're over prepared for the wrong crimes and under prepared for the crimes we actually have. If we're trying to save money, maybe we should look into spending our law enforcement dollars more efficiently, maybe outsource violent crimes to Unified so we can focus in on what our citizens actually deal with. I like that we do our court system through Holiday's justice court, this seems like an effective use of tax dollars by sharing facilities. It's just that after the Terracare debacle, it seems an awful lot like we're saving money by cutting the wrong things while we ignore cost savings we could realize by more efficiently managing the city.

They also park vehicles on the street and don't move them for weeks and in the winter they obstruct snow removal by leaving their cars on the street overnight which results in only a narrow cleared spot down the middle of the road.

Also, when statistics on the Pentagon's 1033 program were released, I noticed our dept. got a number of M-14 assault rifles, and from citizen Drew Begley's Pinterest, it looks like we have at least one with the SOCOM sniper package for a SWAT team. Again, we don't have a lot of violent crime, are we expecting a riot outside Market Street Grill because they ran out of oysters or something? Our worst violent crime statistics were rape and assault, which were still pretty below the city average. Neither of these is more effectively policed with a SWAT program. It seems like we're over prepared for the wrong crimes and under prepared for the crimes we actually have. If we're trying to save money, maybe we should look into spending our law enforcement dollars more efficiently, maybe outsource violent crimes to Unified so we can focus in on what our citizens actually deal with. I like that we do our court system through Holiday's justice court, this seems like an effective use of tax dollars by sharing facilities. It's just that after the Terracare debacle, it seems an awful lot like we're saving money by cutting the wrong things while we ignore cost savings we could realize by more efficiently managing the city.

Take Holladay, Sugarhouse, and 9th and 9th for examples. Even the area around liberty park is making a concerted effort through their zoning and city planning to create these types of areas. I think these types of developments when the city helps guide development create stronger cities and up property values by creating a place that people want to go and be around. They also create a "center or town" that Cottonwood Heights is really missing. Visit Caputos in Holladay on a Saturday night if you want to see what I mean. Cottonwood Heights on the other hand has focused solely on increasing its public works and police departments and adding a giant city hall in a neighborhood area. Now the police department will have to race through school zones in every direction to help anyone. If a new city hall was really necessary they should have put it on Fort Union in a developed commercial area with easier access to the main roads in the city. This isn't going to really directly affect me or my property value I just think it was a poor decision. I know the police force can be an asset and I've never had any interaction with them except seeing them around town where they have all been very friendly. However, driving through town and seeing the large number of them does not make me feel safer it puts everyone on edge and makes Cottonwood Heights very uninviting. I think that with Vail taking over Park City, Cottonwood Heights is going to see a large increase in traffic and visitors. I think there are a lot of opportunities with this and the city should plan for it and try to make the city better.

Everything seems to be going well, I know you have many detractors who don't like to Police Dept. but I have not seen a problem.

Like I said in a question before the Police helped me find my dog I know it was not a big deal but they knew it was to me .. so please tell them Thank you for me

Following a break-in, the police department was outstanding in response time, follow through, and being considerate of the victims involved.

I've not really had to many interactions with Cottonwood Heights. I was very pleased that Cottonwood Heights Police started carrying Narcan/Naloxone.

It has been a tough couple of years for police. I just want to say that I feel we have an outstanding Police Dept. Our emergency response time is excellent, as I understand it. Having a top notch Cottonwood Heights Police Dept. - with local city control is one of most valuable resources.

Police service is great they have a presence and seem to be doing a good job. Worked with zoning in the past and they were awful. Many areas still need gutters and drainage as well as sidewalks. Forget about medians and trees until essentials are done.

Get rid of the big 26? mile marathon that closes main thoroughfares and leaves residents trapped in areas that "lead to nowhere". Also, surveys have been done regarding traffic flow through residential streets, with no outcome in at least one particular case. Why can't citizens count on better communication with/from Council members? It's extremely difficult to understand no action and no communication when we see the very things our survey suggested applied elsewhere - sometimes only a subdivision over. But to our police, emergency and fire depts, we offer our greatest thanks and praise.

Increase police patrolling, especially during the night time. I hardly ever see police after hours.

I have called the police department a few times. I have been very pleased with the response time, and the kindness of the officers. I feel safe and my kids know that they can ask for help from any Cottonwood Heights Police Officer and they will be safe. I love having an officer at the Elementary and Junior High. My children have gone through the DARE program and have loved learning. Thank you for your valuable service!!

The police department is wonderful. they respond faster than any other law enforcement in the state.

Somebody went through the neighborhood stealing mail, and I reported it to the police department, and an officer came right out to investigate.

Police officers responded quickly to a break in at my business this month. Not much can evidently be done but I did receive a follow up call from an officer and gave him information about the path the criminal took. Not sure if they followed up on questions to the houses behind me where they jumped the fence. They did a good job, I think the system just can't do much with the leads.

Emergency vehicles responded quickly to a medical emergency I had in November 2015 and were efficient and kind.

Police were called to our street a couple of times and responded quickly. I think the way the police handled customers of the Canyon Inn was awful.

Had great service from the police department. Something was taken out of my garage. Caught the

person and returned the item.

My car was broken into while parked at my home. The police were professional and were able to return my stolen items.

The police have been very helpful in watching for individuals who are casing houses to steal. Very prompt and concerned. Makes me feel the police actually care and want to keep us safe.

Police officers have been friendly and courteous during any and all contacts as well as all City employees in general.

The police dept. has gone out of it's way to promote unity within the community. It is readily available for community events and participates when asked.

My house was broken into and the Police were great.

We recently had our alarm system go off in the middle of the night. The response time from the police was so fast, it ended up being our CO2 alarm so the fire department was called out and they also came very quick. Makes me feel safe that if anything like that were to happen again I'd be safe

My wife and I went to Citizens Police Academy and it was AWESOME!!! Thanx again for the invite. We definitely have a Police Force that cares and does a great job!!!

Cops do a great job, they try. Snow removal is a joke. Go back with the county contract.

I think the police do an exceptional job. They are quick to respond and are quite professional.

I appreciate the time Cottonwood Heights service men and women do for our community.

Don't spend tax dollars on anything but basic necessities. Police , streets, fire, (and such)

Request mayor to take a pay cut. :)

Police response very good. Disappointed couldn't find stolen truck from our garage.

I've always had good experiences with the police department, fire department, and many other services all except the snow removal. No need to go on with that because you are making positive moves to correct it this coming winter. I thank you for that.

I think you should know that my neighbors were treated badly by the police department about a stolen car. The thief ran over my neighbor's light post while backing the car out of their driveway and it's costing them thousands of dollars to replace. But they were told that they did it by themselves to profit from the insurance company. Parking on Racquet Club drive is a joke. We've been promised for years that something would be done about it, but nothing ever is.

Zoning for height restrictions for buildings on the Canyon Center Projects have been violated repeatedly and you wonder why we as neighbors loose faith in our elected officials.

Mostly the police department, and it is one of the best!

I would like to see free summer music held in a local park. I love the splash park off of 7200 s., is that part of cottonwood heights?, I love seeing our sheriffs and police out patrolling.

The snow removal service is horrible. The police are excellent. It remains a "City" without any character.

Snow removal is awful compared to when county did it. I hope it now improves. Police are terrific. They don't get enough credit. Council does well with budgeting. Wish codes for property upkeep were stronger.

Asked compliance officer about an outbuilding my neighbor wished to build on the side yard of his house. We then discussed the issue with the neighbor and he did not build it. Compliance officer was very knowledgeable. Also asked him about a neighbor playing drums. He was helpful.

After hours construction noise violations are a big problem to me. The code enforcement and police have tried to be helpful but violations are flagrant and repetitive and apparently without consequence. The permit holder should be made aware of CH codes and be held responsible for failure to comply. It is frustrating/stressful for me as a resident to have to constantly call the police for help in getting compliance. the building dept must become more proactive so that the police do not have be reactive.

Terracare sucks at snow removal. I know that it has gone back to the city now, but they were awful. I love the police and fire departments, but I was disappointed in the closure of the Canyon Inn because of police harassment. It was a nice community area and a traditional with our friends and family. I understand there are politics and whatnot surrounding it, but I was sad to see it go. I am nervous about the huge increase in population and what has been happening with zoning at the mouth of big Cottonwood. I really would hate to see Cottonwood Heights fall prey to the high rise and high density living communities, since our mountains are why I live here (specifically I am talking about the areas just south of the 7-11 on Wasatch Blvd and Ft Union, what will happen with the site of the gravel pit in the future, and the development on the north side of the canyon at the mouth of Big Cottonwood). I would also love to see an off leash dog park somewhere, as it is really what is needed for dogs to be able to socialize and get exercise and

right now I have to drive up Millcreek canyon and pay a pass there.

Outstanding fire and police services

Paramedics got to my house in record time on March 23rd and assisted my daughter in taking me to the Intermountain Medical Center. They noticed an open window in my basement and came through that window instead of breaking down my front door. They were polite, kind, and helped me get medical treatment in record time. I commend them. We had an autistic granddaughter get angry and go out of control and the police came. They not only settled her down, but helped her resolve her problem. I have never seen police treat children this kind before and yet be stern enough to let her know they would be back if it happened again. It hasn't happened again and we attribute this to the way they handled the situation. The child's mother was grateful also. Any training that police and fire officials can take on how to deal with AUTISM would be productive and prudent. These children don't act like other children and if you don't know how to deal with autistic children, you can make the situation worse. There are many places for officers to gain training on this problem. But the two officers responding to our granddaughter were obviously in tune with children with autism and they did a stellar job of getting the problem solved.

Very happy with our Mayor, Council and Police Department. They are very easy to get a hold of and responsive to concerns etc.

Great appreciation for the Fire and Police Departments for the services they provide to the residents of the City.

We have only been here 1.5 years. We had a call with the fire department and they were great. The rec center is awesome. The police presence seems very good. I dealt with the building department and they were very helpful. We really enjoy living in this community

Snow removal has improved. There is no effort to improve street lighting to avoid light pollution. There has been no sidewalk maintenance in my neighborhood ever. Law enforcement appears to be good but for the actions to put the 7-11 and Canyon Inn out of business, which are outrageous.

I, along with everyone else think that the snow removal services need to be improved. On some of the horrible storms my coworker that works just on the border of Sandy has his street plowed immediately while we waited for days. I think its also absurd for people to only have two wheel drive cars in this city for winter driving but we need to get things plowed before ice ruins the roads. I also believe the current zoning laws are terrible as far as retail commercial development and are not only deterring small businesses but I'm sure they are not constitutional. Zoning and police powers in the 14th ammendment are not that far reaching. I also think that the city really needs to consider going back to the unified police department. The size of this city does not need its own police department especially this large. You should also quit/modify the quota system. They should be helping people not just trying to raise their own money. If there is going to be such a large police force their focus should be on really helping citizens making sure children aren't being abused etc. Not just being traffic cops. I do appreciate that they got Naxalone for the officers. I think that is very forward thinking and I hope it helps people.

I have an issue with the fee the Wasatch Recycling wants for a green waste can. It saves them a lot of money to have residents fill a green waste bin, so I would like to see that provided at no charge.

I still want to see the Cottonwood Heights Rec Center available to all of Cottonwood Heights. I know we would have to pay to be part of that service district, but I think if the whole city paid a fee then the fees would be less for everyone. It doesn't make sense that such a big part of the city is not available to me.

I have an issue with the drainage on my road. I am on a private lane, but water from a public road turns the corner onto my private lane and I end up with the problems. It has been hard to convince anyone at the city that it need to be the city's issue to bring the drainage on Siesta Drive up to code.

I appreciated the timely manner the police responded to a call I made about a bike being stolen.

The Cottonwood Heights Police Department has been the center of many issues and the corruption of the department needs to be fixed because it is unacceptable. Giving police incentives for tickets and DUIs that they hand out should not be how a police department 'serves and protects' a community.

We have too many police on the payroll. It isn't justified. (No, none of my household have been ticketed -- yet. But we suspect that it's only a matter of time.)

I love mountainview park but their needs to be more police patrol through the neighborhood to the east of there becuz the traffic has increase and so has the speed

I think the police should do a better job of enforcing traffic laws. I live by the intersection of highland and Bengal. The number of vehicles running the red light is horrifying. I think traffic laws are not enforced.

I did not like the article in the Cottonwood Heights newsletter regarding stray animals i.e. cats. It is disgusting how many cats our neighborhood has and you can watch them stalking birds. I think there should be stricter rules for roaming cats.

There is no enforcement of zoning in our neighborhood there is a single dwelling with 4 families. They have so many cars they are parked on the lawn.

The police bully people, no tickets are issued to illegal parking around the Cottonwood Heights Rec. Center, the snow removal and streets have been awful since you disavowed the County service.

police force shows so much bravery when they write leash law infractions for people playing fetch with their dogs in a empty park. oh yeah, and no dog parks so that sucks.

I often wonder if the pendulum has cycled 180 degrees with respect to police. Under the county, the sheriff support was dismal, in fact that was a big part of my voting to incorporate. Now I wonder if our police force is too big for a city our size. I think there is some middle ground.

Cottonwood police would'nt even help me jump start my car while stranded in the dead of winter due to a "liability" reason

Change speed limit to 40mph, Remove speed radar (absolutely worthless and not enforced by police) on 2300 East.

I have complained about speeding down 2325 East several times and nothing is being done.

I am very disappointment in the way Canyon Inn was treated. I believe it was a real estate scandal. Cottonwood Heights police have also been known (reported in the paper several times throughout the last year) to harass citizens if they don't fit in a nice little box (please pick up on the metaphor). My biggest concern is to create a more walking and biking friendly town, particularly over Fort Union Blvd. This is a great divider in our community. Slow the traffic by either curving the road or using speed-bumps. Provide more crosswalks. This is a really dangerous and community-splitting road, affecting both our safety and economy.

Traffic enforcement. I often feel like the CHPD targets intersections looking for minor infractions to generate revenue. Not the best use of time in my opinion.

Cottonwood Heights city services are invisible. It's like the city doesn't exist except for roads, an or aggressive police department and some poor city policies with respect to land and land development. One clear example is the poor sidewalk maintenance. The sidewalks in our neighborhood are so poor that we walk in the street for fear that we will break an ankle. Another example is the poor road maintenance. Creek road is one example. The Sandy side of the street is 10 times better than the Cottonwood Heights side of the street. Why not work with Sandy to have a complete road resurfacing rather than just one side of the street. What a glowing example of poor management!!

Police speed traps used to produce revenue, example: hiding a patrol car on a side street of the steep hill on 94th South. It is nearly impossible to exactly maintain the speed limit going down this hill

Appalled at what happened at the intersection of Ft Union and Wasatch Blvd to the Club there and what has happened to the 7-11's business due to what was done to those business for personal gain of some public figures. Especially using my tax dollars to pull it off.

We were assaulted in our home. The cottonwood heights police dept. refuse to arrest the perpetrators. We were in our home. They were not invited. They had no injuries. Both my husband and I did. Total failure by the police dept. and officer Dawson. I wish I would have had more recourses or at least access to Robbie Russo to discuss this. I tried everything to get an audience with him and was denied.

The traffic control in the ski season is non-existent. Residents cannot get in or out of the neighborhoods in time for work, school, appointments. With all of the police presence we used to see at the Canyon Inn, it is hard to believe there is no attempt made to deal with that. Except to talk about trains in the canyons through the mountains. Unless the effort is to make life so miserable that we agree to pay any price for that over-kill of a solution.

The average person doesn't see the ugly underbelly of this org. It has gone down hill drimatically. Tell me....you pick on business but can clean up Chadborne? Get a grip. Take a lesson from Dirty Harry. Fight for the people not the good name of the mayor.

The police are over baring and flat out jerks. I have not been pulled over but in other interactions they act above the people they serve. Sidewalks are rediculos. Curbs and gutters are ok. What action?!?! Would your vigilante officer have shot me?? I feel safe in my community only UNTIL I have to deal with any officer from CHPD!!!!

Terrible police force. Hassles & bullies everyone except when you actually ask them to patrol your area & then tgey never show up at all.

I think our police department is a shit storm. I feel like they should be reduced and done away with. I hate they mayor he should be replaced, same goes for the rest of the city council. This city came with great promises and some have been achieved. At our home we had an attempted home invasion while my two young sons and I were home alone in the middle of the night someone was trying to



break down our door, after calling the police immediately after realizing our dire situation I was appalled and very shaken at how long it took the police to come to our home to remove the offender, later Learning that the inebriated individual was just taken to the police station to sleep off the alcohol even after I wrote a very detailed description of the events this individual was not properly disciplined. Only later to come back to our home with his two roommates and only to harass and demean my sons and I while my husband (who is in the army) was not home. My sons and I will never quite recovered from that traumatic experience and I blame 80% of that on the Cottonwood Heights police!

The Mayor needs to focus on running the City, not invoking his personal beliefs and options on the citizens, and use the police force to bolster his ego We love cottonwood heights. We love the community. Please don't forget though, that people of all faiths have a right to live and prosper in Utah as well. Stop shutting down the bars. The animal control officers are very friendly and quick to respond.

called police at 2 am, were told an officer would drive by. Called again around 8 am, officer responded and then told us he had never received the call during the night. Had large bird in fireplace, no animal control and police refused to help. We extracted the bird ourselves.

Lets get back to basics. Return to UPD, Return to County services. Everything you try to "make more cost effective and improve fails miserably"

It is very difficult to reach anyone at any agency when I try. The answering machine is about the only employee I have spoken with. When I do reach the City Manager he is very helpful. I would like to know how to reach someone at the Police Dept. just to ask questions and not have to dial 911.

Lack of response from the police department when a contractor was doing unauthorized work on our condominium property by one of our home owners in the Timber Ridge West Condominium Association and Officer Lavado was going to come and issue a Stop and Decease order. He never showed and damage was done to our property.

The roads in my neighborhood suck because the mayor and cop chief are in bed together and more into power and having an empire!

Why did you close the canyon inn? This town needs more bars not less.

Too many cops. They have nothing better to do than harass high school students and people walking their dogs. Fire them. We need enough cops to stop crime, not harass citizens. We need better response times to emergencies. I was there the day the kid drowned in the rec center pool. It took 20 minutes for the paramedics to arrive, and then they WALKED to the kid! There can be no excuse for this.

* Snow removal

* Police

* Road repair

Snowplowing service has been pretty bad since the switch to TerraCare. The number of police officers seems excessive. There seem to be police everywhere in Cottonwood Heights and and there seem to be new officers hired all the time. I'm not sure it's necessary for the taxpayers to be paying for that many officers.

Snow removal has been a problem in the past. The operators often neglect my section of the street which is at a dead-end.

My street seems to be one of the last to get snow removal so I can't rate that very high. It's a steep hill but still requires assistance in winter and should be given the same courtesy as any other residential area. Also, such a huge portion of my property taxes go to the public school system which I never used and that will always be frustrating. My children were all home schooled and I had to pay for everything plus taxes to public schools. There should be some credit or allowance regarding this since home schooling is legal. Yes, it's a choice, but a valid one.

Snow removal was a dismal failure for the past few years. NOW, what will all the new snow removal equipment cost us? We should have left the service under the county.

Poor response for snow/ice removal.

We should have glass recycle at present we have to drive to Holladay to recycle

Return to the good old days when the county provided services

Current police dept is not doing job. Their job seems to be to issue tickets and harass people coming from drinking establishments

. We need a farmers market

It seems strange to have folks rate CHC's own snow removal. I'm not sure CHC actually got started. The county snow removal was just fine. When that contract was ended and CHC went with a contractor that was terrible. I don't recall it getting any better. Our town has a reputation for being on that seems to write tickets to finance city government.

Just issues with how long it takes for my circle to be cleared of snow. I was stranded at home for a full work day and 1/2 this winter due to snow not being remove in my circle. I don't think residents in circles are any less important than the main neighborhood streets

Snow removal service seems improved since that fiasco with the contractor. That's good. We get a lot of snow !

Obviously the snow plowing has been an issue. Also, it takes quite some time for road repairs to happen, so that needs to be addresses so pot holes, etc can be fixed in a timely manner.

I still find the snow removal to be quite disappointing. I know I don't live on a main road but nevertheless I would expect to have my street clear in a timely manner, or at least before it compacts and becomes an ice rink.

Snow removal has been a joke since TerraCare took over. I also think the police are overzealous. I've been pulled over and given a ticket for a headlight out. Don't they have more important things to worry about?

Snow removal was awful last season. Hopefully you have a better contractor.

Speeding on Promenade Drive ("upper section") is excessive and had continuously gotten worse over the last ten years. Would be great to get speed bumps/dips.

Snow removal continues to be an issue. There are too many police officers, sitting, writing tickets getting paid too much to do not much in the city. Please consider removing the "7 sacred Speed Bumps" that were installed on about 6400 south and 2300 e. You can do the same thing with 3 speed bumps of smaller size!

I feel like the city is not interacting with the residents efficiently. You need to figure out a way to limit the bureaucratic feel the city has developed over the years. Reach out more, hold informal out reach meetings, be truly open to suggestions from the community.

Snow plows dislodged my mailbox. After a couple calls to the city "Danny" took care of it. Thanks Danny!

Walking daily around Bywater Park, don't understand how we can require homeowners to shovel sidewalks, by City ignores these, and the sidewalk on the south side of Fort Union from 2700 E. To 2300 East.

Snow and street maintenance is pathetic.

Snowplow destroyed my parking strip and leaves a mess at the bend of our street for us to dig out.

Snow removal company is poor. Zoning, and overall improvement of neighborhoods and keeping homeowners accountable for maintenance of lawn and ordinances is poor. It's a really ugly city frankly

I have resided in Cottonwood Heights for over 30 years and never had damage due to snow removal till the last 2 years. I live in a circl so I expect to be last for removal, but the removals is shoddy at best!

Terracare sucks at snow removal. I know that it has gone back to the city now, but they were awful. I love the police and fire departments, but I was disappointed in the closure of the Canyon Inn because of police harassment. It was a nice community area and a traditional with our friends and family. I understand there are politics and whatnot surrounding it, but I was sad to see it go. I am nervous about the huge increase in population and what has been happening with zoning at the mouth of big Cottonwood. I really would hate to see Cottonwood Heights fall prey to the high rise and high density living communities, since our mountains are why I live here (specifically I am talking about the areas just south of the 7-11 on Wasatch Blvd and Ft Union, what will happen with the site of the gravel pit in the future, and the development on the north side of the canyon at the mouth of Big Cottonwood). I would also love to see an off leash dog park somewhere, as it is really what is needed for dogs to be able to socialize and get exercise and right now I have to drive up Millcreek canyon and pay a pass there.

Snow removal is bad. Let's get rid of the contractor and go back to government provided service.

Neighborhoods and young children need positive exposure to the police that serve and protect...Get out of the cruiser and meet the people...simple solution...face + name to a badge.

The city and mayor was deceitful and unethical to the citizens of Cottonwood Heights in the way they handled the Cottonwood Corporate Center. They seem to be more concerned with the tax revenue generated by the Corporate Center than keeping their promises to the citizens. The snow removal program has been a disaster in the past few years. I am pleased with the new Butler Elementary and Butler Middle School buildings. I think that CH has done a good job in offering activities, programs and events to its citizens. Taxes in CH are some of the highest in the state....doesn't that mean that we should have the best schools, police department, snow removal programs, etc.?

The privatization of the snow removal services sucked. I actually had a snow removal truck back into my driveway to turn around. The trucks are huge. I have not idea if my driveway is rated for a vehicle of that much weight.

HORRIBLE SNOW REMOVAL-untimely. Built new city offices we had no vote on. Unified police were better!!

Snow removal on main streets may not be taking place. Pedestrians seem to have to fend for themselves on long stretches of main roadways. Also in my neighborhood there's no sidewalks. Consider adding city-paid-for sidewalks to preexisting homes in neighborhoods which don't already have them. The snow removal trucks need to slow way down when coming down the hills, especially Highland Dr. They are moving so fast that they are throwing snow and salt 8-12 feet up into the yards. The salt/sand mixture is very damaging to plants and grass.

Our subdivision has had water line replacement within the past year and there have had some issues with the street sinking or surfacing material left

behind. This has been an issue with snow removal and garbage pickup. It has also become more dangerous walking/biking along the Danish Road area with more housing development/traffic and no bike lanes or sidewalks.

Snow removal hasn't been up to par since switching service providers, and the scandal around our police department is concerning. I also believe the current zoning laws are terrible as far as retail commercial development and are not only deterring small businesses but I'm sure they are not constitutional. The size of this city does not need its own police department especially this large. You should also quit/modify the quota system. They should be helping people not just trying to raise their own money. I do appreciate that they got Naxalone for the officers. I think that is very forward thinking and I hope it helps people.

We have also experienced a couple of extended power outages in the last couple of years and wonder if this is something that deserves some attention to prevent it in the future.

Snow removal slow but netter than the prior year

I hope that snow removal services are improved for Winter 2017. Terracare was a joke the past several years. That has been the worst part of living in Cottonwood Heights.

The decision of Cotton Wood Heights to Hire a Denver Company (Tera Care)to do maintenance of the roadways was a major flaw in an overall management of the City. I believe the vetting of this contractor was poorly performed and it has proven out as now the City has decided to take on some of the maintenance with their own crews. Why would the City send its Utah Tax Dollars to a Denver Company when there are many local companies that could provide these services. Cottonwood Heights City is a young and growing city and will make mistakes as they develop programs. as Citizens of the City we need to have more information about the proposed decisions they are making with our tax dollars. the bulletin published monthly should be increased to a bi monthly and be detailed as to what the City Council and the Planning and Zoning are reviewing and proposing. That way citizens could be more informed and may elect to attend the public meetings to voice their concerns or opinions.

Hopefully the snow removal debacle is behind us.

Our police department is a waste of money. It has not improved the safety of our community.

Snow removal over the past 2 winters for our area has diminished greatly compared to what it used to be 3-5 years ago. It used to be that by 5 or 6 am every morning, our neighborhood roads were cleared and during a bad storm, by the mid afternoon the roads would be cleared in our neighborhood. Today, during normal storms, it gets cleared in the evening most of the time and during bad storms, the snow plow is so late (in most cases more than 24-48 hours after the storm ended) that all the snow has been smashed into ice. And when it hasn't really snowed that much in our area, we see snow plows driving around the neighborhood with nothing really to clear. Just seems like the private company handling the snow plow service isn't managing their snow plows effectively, at least as it pertains to our neighborhood.

The snow removal company that was hired several years ago is the worst I have ever seen. I would like to go back to utilizing Salt Lake County. I know there were reports that the private company was improving but that is only for people living East of Wasatch Blvd. The plows cleared a centered lane in the streets leaving at least 3 or 4 inches on each side of the road full of snow until in finally melted in April.

I had to call several times to get the snow removal on our streets in the past few years

. The condition of our sidewalks or terrible they are in great need of repair - most of the sidewalk is uneven - I actually tripped several years ago as I was walking, hurt my hand & it took years for it to get better- I called your office they came out and they spray painted the areas that the sidewalks were raised up & actually standing up- paint has faded & no repair has been done- I told several of my neighbors that there is a 50-50 program and to call you to take care of the sidewalk but I guess that's not going to happen. i'm sure more people will trip and get hurt

The only services I am unhappy with is the snow removal and street maintenance. Snow removal is almost non-existent in my neighborhood since the independent contractor took over. I feel their drivers are inexperienced. I often see their trucks stuck in gutters, plowing into electrical control boxes, and simply stalled in the middle of streets. I see them plowing a street that has already been plowed while other streets haven't been plowed before. I also see plows driving on streets that need to be plowed but their plow isn't engaged with the ground. Often, my circle doesn't see a plow until 48 hours after a storm. My area also has very bad streets but i just see temporary patches made. Also, resources for street repair seem to be wasted as roads are torn up after a road has been resurfaced, painted, then all of a sudden the road is torn up again? It just doesn't make sense.

Very poor snow removal>

very poor snow removal but when we called they promptly responded

My experience with Terracare's snow removal efforts was probably the same as many others. The city's decision to cancel the contract speaks for itself. I also feel other services Terracare provides should be evaluated. One of their crews was dispatched to fill a dip in the street near my home and they did a terrible job. I haven't addressed it with The Public Works Dept. because I've been told that the county needs to do repair work on a water line in that area of the street. I felt it would be a waste of resources to work on an area that was scheduled to be dug up anyway. (I didn't request the dip repair. A neighbor who was unaware of the water line issue did.) I did contact my councilman about snow removal issues and he was very responsive. I really appreciated his interest in solving these problems.

We have a neighbor who plows our street for us often to avoid packing the snow down and creating an icy mess. I appreciate his kind service, but it sure would be nice if the city paid him to spend his entire day removing snow from our street, or took a few moments to swing a plow up our street.

Our neighborhood for the past 10 years has suffered frequent break ins and thefts from our homes, garages and yards. We never see patrol cars in our neighborhood. The snow removal crew tears up our park strip every year often including sprinkler lines and heads. We are happy the contract with this outside agency has been cancelled.

We've been trying to get a gaping pothole on our street fixed for years with no response. Snow plows sometimes skip plowing our street

Mt View Park gets watered too much. In the morning there are pools of water on the soccer fields. The sprinklers are on during the rain. Also, I miss the bigger snowplows that actually got rid of the snow on the first pass.

Police force is excellent! Need to do something about snow removal.

It seems sometimes though the the City looks for things to spend money on e g City Hall when other things are let go that are more basic to citizen needs e.g. Road repair in the neighborhoods, snow removal, code enforcement.

I've always had good experiences with the police department, fire department, and many other services all except the snow removal. No need to go on with that because you are making positive moves to correct it this coming winter. I thank you for that.

I think you should know that my neighbors were treated badly by the police department about a stolen car. The thief ran over my neighbor's light post while backing the car out of their driveway and it's costing them thousands of dollars to replace. The asphalt at the end of our driveway is total disintegrated and leaving large holes. After complaining to CH public works, they made a visit and promised it would be fixed over two years ago. That has yet to happen.

My yard/drive floods whenever there is a heavy rain. I have requested help and a solution to this problem for many years. I have been bounced from department to department repeatedly. At one time I was told the water flooding my drive - about 10 inches - was coming from my roof. ??? Last fall I had to pitch a full blown irate hissy fit to get any sort of response from the city engineering their response was to call them when a big storm was imminent. Huh? You don't know what the weather is doing - look out the window. I was also told that the storm drain was backed up and didn't get completely cleaned out when they were doing work. When I asked when it would be cleaned out I was told when they got to it in the meantime (now going on 10 years) I was told to deal with it. Their final solution was to line my sidewalk with sandbags - since they would do nothing to prevent any flooding I am not sure what their purpose was. They are still there trapping trash and leaning against my fence and staining it. Oddly enough, the flooding issue is now fixed with the new city building going in on Bengal Blvd. I am not the only resident on Bengal who has had this issue and who has complained. I have had untold dollars worth of damage to my property from this issue. My front landscaping has been pretty much destroyed and most of the wood chips in my backyard have ended up in my neighbors yard. When asked what I could do about this, I was met with a shrug. Not my problem.

I sent an email to public works about the condition of our roads and got a response that nothing is planned for our neighborhood. In the same message I also pointed out that we are having a problem with rats and was informed I would have to contact someone else.

Sidewalk and asphalt road repair

I have pot holes in front of my home and there is a dip in the gutter that collects water where bugs are allowed to grow. I have lived in my home for 10 years and this gutter has always been like this. Address: 2758 E 7265 S.

The road edge is breaking off in my driveway and my neighbors driveway. My neighbor has been to the city offices about this with no satisfaction. (7100 Chris Lane). The people at the office just argue with him.

Need more regularly street repair and main drainage cleaning

The streets and gutters in my neighborhood are horrific. I bottom out and damage my vehicle no matter how slow I go. They need to be stripped down and regraded. I'm also not happy with the homeless and drug abusers roaming the streets or the amount of trash my neighbors are allowed to gather in their yards. Last but not least, trees that overhang on the roads need to be trimmed up and back so vehicles don't hit them. Cottonwood Heights has so

We've been trying to get a gaping pothole on our street fixed for years with no response. Snow plows sometimes skip plowing our street

One issue I have noticed is that neighborhood roads never seem to be fixed. Most are crumbling on the edges. which leads to a back up in the sewer system.

I would appreciate cleaner and clearer streets. i think Ft. Union Blvd is so ugly with all the signs, power poles etc. The cultural benefits and so great.

I am frustrated with the lack of inspection of the construction of our neighborhood sewer lines. I have had several disasters in my home due to the poor installation of our sewer line out to the main. Every home in our circle has a problem. You can see the cracking of the pavement that shows the excessive settling of the sewer lines to each home. I feel very victimized and helpless about the problem.

I think the road service is really lacking. To many streets are in need of repair and nothing seems to get done. In the Winter if we could really hire a company that has enough snow plows to clear our streets. The past two years have been a bad joke.

The water supply line broke at the end of E. Summer Oaks Cir. late fall of 2015. Repairs began immediately and service restored promptly. A 40 foot hole was excavated for the repairs and following completion of said repairs a barricade set in place on the perimeter. Some basic clean up was made in the following week but the excavated hole was left un attended and remained so till late spring 2016. It wasn't until local residence call the city office to complain. It took a week to get the hole filled in and paved over and even then clean up was minimal leaving at least 2-3 cubic yards of debris at the curb. There were no pass downs between the AM and PM shifts causing delays and confusion. Tempo of work by members on site could not have been slower. My teenage sons could complete this job in the half the time your so called professionals. 6 months to complete this job that should have taken at most a week for a typical dysfunctional bureaucracy or 3 days for an efficient functioning private sector business. Because you decided to subcontract out repairs to private companies puts city management ultimately responsibility that work is being done at a satisfactory level and within a reasonable time frame. I don't expect work to be done at the level of quality and time one would expect from a well managed private company but by inefficient city bureaucracy standards this is well short of acceptable. Was there a project manager among city managers to monitor the quality of work and time to completion? Why was there not a letter sent to the local residence effected stating when the work would be completed?

Score: F

City streets remain in disrepair and the attempts to fix even the surface with asphalt is poorly done. Take a look at the recent patch completed at 3500 East and Bengal. The patch is rougher to drive over than the old surface they tried to improve.

It would be good to have a street sweeper come through our neighborhood. The gutters do not drain well and there are large puddles in front of the houses and then muddy or dry dirt piles up in the low spots.

I would like to see some additional street repair in some of the residential areas.

The road maintenance is a joke. There are potholes and deteriorating roadways everywhere except for the main arteries. The preventative maintenance is seem to be nonexistent. There doesn't appear to be any self initiated by the city. It only acts on complaints.

The code enforcement over steps.

There was an incident where he entered a house without consent from the home owner in our neighborhood because he saw a repair vehicle parked in front of the house.

Every city vehicle should be capable of noting on an app where there are bad roads. There should be proactive maintenance without the overwhelming need for complaints. they are constantly working on the road area on fort union boulevard and 1300 east area. about 10 times in the last 3 years. then they leave the signs and barricades for 3 to 4 weeks after they are gone. there seems to be no oversight over where they put barricades.

Snow removal and street sweeping more frequently would be nice.

I am hoping that the Terracare nightmare is over for good. From unfinished street work over the past 2 years to workers using my home water hose to fill their trucks to zero snow removal in my area, it was a colossal failure. The Creek Road project that was recently done by SL County was a great example of public works competence.

I am glad that Terra Care is being dumped as the snow removal contractor and street maintenance service. The decision to employ them was a catastrophic mistake.

The only services I am unhappy with is the snow removal and street maintenance. Snow removal is almost non-existent in my neighborhood since the independent contractor took over. I feel their drivers are inexperienced. I often see their trucks stuck in gutters, plowing into electrical control boxes, and simply stalled in the middle of streets. I see them plowing a street that has already been plowed while other streets haven't been plowed before. I also see plows driving on streets that need to be plowed but their plow isn't engaged with the ground. Often, my circle doesn't see a plow until 48 hours after a storm. My area also has very bad streets but I just see temporary patches made. Also, resources for street repair seem to be wasted as roads are torn up after a road has been resurfaced, painted, then all of a sudden the road is torn up again? It just doesn't make sense.

My experience with Terracare's snow removal efforts was probably the same as many others. The city's decision to cancel the contract speaks for itself. I also feel other services Terracare provides should be evaluated. One of their crews was dispatched to fill a dip in the street near my home and they did a terrible job. I haven't addressed it with The Public Works Dept. because I've been told that the county needs to do repair work on a water line in that area of the street. I felt it would be a waste of resources to work on an area that was scheduled to be dug up anyway. (I didn't request the dip repair. A neighbor who was unaware of the water line issue did.) I did contact my councilman about snow removal issues and he was very responsive. I really appreciated his interest in solving these problems.

snow removal at my last residence was not sufficient and signage posting new laws regarding parking rules were not presented ahead of getting towed.

many roads are in bad shape and need repaving.

the cemetery off bengal needs to reopen to the dog community its back area for walking

we need an official fully fenced in dog park where off leash is allowed water bowls hose and bags are provided-its cottonwood there should be money for this and many people would use it.

Our snow removal the last two years have been horrible. Most of our neighbors has been forced to snowplow our own cul-de-sac. We have lots of potholes in our streets that are not getting filled.

Cottonwood Heights police have also been known (reported in the paper several times throughout the last year) to harass citizens if they don't fit in a nice little box (please pick up on the metaphor). My biggest concern is to create a more walking and biking friendly town, particularly over Fort Union Blvd. This is a great divider in our community. Slow the traffic by either curving the road or using speed-bumps. Provide more crosswalks. This is a really dangerous and community-splitting road, affecting both our safety and economy.

For example street lighting. I was under the impression you were doing away with designer street lights with underground wiring, yet in my neighborhood there are new street lights with the CHC logo. I love those lights but I appreciate they can be difficult to maintain. Street lighting is a nice feature to have...

Sidewalks: I don't want sidewalks on residential streets, at least don't retrofit old neighborhoods with new sidewalks. Save my tax dollars and put them to use somewhere else and I'll walk in the street and be just fine.

Street Maintenance: If you are going to reseal the street, have the presence of mind to update the underground wiring to the street lights before updating the asphalt.

Cottonwood Heights city services are invisible. It's like the city doesn't exist except for roads, an or aggressive police department and some poor city policies with respect to land and land development. One clear example is the poor sidewalk maintenance. The sidewalks in our neighborhood are so poor that we walk in the street for fear that we will break an ankle. Another example is the poor road maintenance. Creek road is one example. The Sandy side of the street is 10 times better than the Cottonwood Heights side of the street. Why not work with Sandy to have a complete road resurfacing rather than just one side of the street. What a glowing example of poor management!!

I also had a telephone pole on fire and they put a new one in but haven't removed the old one. I am in the middle of landscaping the parking strip and can't finish until the old pole is removed. As much as I love the biking lanes (I am a biker) it is dangerous to ride close to the side of the road as there is so much gravel, glass, debris etc. as if an accident happens they just sweep it aside where we ride.... We have lived in our home over 52 years, services come and go. Our taxes are two times the amount our entire house payments were. The streets and gutters are falling apart, neighborhood as you enter off Fort Union makes us all look bad.

I am very disappointed in the way Canyon Inn was treated. I believe it was a real estate scandal. Cottonwood Heights police have also been known (reported in the paper several times throughout the last year) to harass citizens if they don't fit in a nice little box (please pick up on the metaphor). My biggest concern is to create a more walking and biking friendly town, particularly over Fort Union Blvd. This is a great divider in our community. Slow the traffic by either curving the road or using speed-bumps. Provide more crosswalks. This is a really dangerous and community-splitting road, affecting both our safety and economy.

The police are over bearing and flat out jerks. I have not been pulled over but in other interactions they act above the people they serve. Sidewalks are ridiculous. Curbs and gutters are ok. Streets need help. New center by Brighton is a waste of money considering all the empty office buildings that already exist

No recycling of glass and then there is to be an additional charge is far behind most other cities. Property tax assessments seem to have no basis in consistency when my house is assessed based on selling price and the house across the street had over \$100,000 in remodeling done and they pay less than I do. The fact that most city/county/state offices are held by republicans is appalling.

I hate paying for recycling when I don't want it. I rather have pot holes repaired, and snow plowed.

Need more frequent pick up of large garbage items (dumpsters); need street lights on 2870 E and surrounding streets; need retro-fitted with sidewalks on 2870 E and surrounding streets; pass through sidewalks are not well maintained. Thanks for your consideration!!

I had to call several times to get the snow removal on our streets in the past few years

. The condition of our sidewalks or terrible they are in great need of repair - most of the sidewalk is uneven - I actually tripped several years ago as I was walking, hurt my hand & it took years for it to get better- I called your office they came out and they spray painted the areas that the sidewalks were raised up & actually standing up- paint has faded & no repair has been done- I told several of my neighbors that there is a 50-50 program and to call you to take care of the sidewalk but I guess that's not going to happen. i'm sure more people will trip and get hurt

It would be good to have a street sweeper come through our neighborhood. The gutters do not drain well and there are large puddles in front of the houses and then muddy or dry dirt piles up in the low spots.

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For example street lighting. I was under the impression you were doing away with designer street lights with underground wiring, yet in my neighborhood there are new street lights with the CHC logo. I love those lights but I appreciate they can be difficult to maintain. Street lighting is a nice feature to have...

Sidewalks: I don't want sidewalks on residential streets, at least don't retrofit old neighborhoods with new sidewalks. Save my tax dollars and put them to use somewhere else and I'll walk in the street and be just fine.

Street Maintenance: If you are going to reseal the street, have the presence of mind to update the underground wiring to the street lights before updating the asphalt.

I have an issue with the fee the Wasatch Recycling wants for a green waste can. It saves them a lot of money to have residents fill a green waste bin, so I would like to see that provided at no charge.

I still want to see the Cottonwood Heights Rec Center available to all of Cottonwood Heights. I know we would have to pay to be part of that service district, but I think if the whole city paid a fee then the fees would be less for everyone. It doesn't make sense that such a big part of the city is not available to me.

I have an issue with the drainage on my road. I am on a private lane, but water from a public road turns the corner onto my private lane and I end up with the problems. It has been hard to convince anyone at the city that it need to be the city's issue to bring the drainage on Siesta Drive up to code.

I appreciated the timely manner the police responded to a call I made about a bike being stolen.

Police service is great they have a presence and seem to be doing a good job. Worked with zoning in the past and they were awful. Many areas still need gutters and drainage as well as sidewalks. Forget about medians and trees until essentials are done.

Too many cops. They have nothing better to do than harass high school students and people walking their dogs. Fire them. We need enough cops to stop crime, not harass citizens. We need better response times to emergencies. I was there the day the kid drowned in the rec center pool. It took 20 minutes for the paramedics to arrive, and then they WALKED to the kid! There can be no excuse for this.

Finally, as for park maintenance, we need the county, the rec center, and the school district to get together on the maintenance for Butler Park. They mow on different days and have different watering schedules for the various parts of the lawn. Really? And in the winter nobody will accept responsibility for clearing the sidewalk through the park so kids can walk to school. This is just an example of finger-pointing, and it's embarrassing to watch.

Asked compliance officer about an outbuilding my neighbor wished to build on the side yard of his house. We then discussed the issue with the neighbor and he did not build it. Compliance officer was very knowledgeable. Also asked him about a neighbor playing drums. He was helpful.

We have a neighbor who does not take care of his property. When we have complained we have received timely response. I would like to see the city take an active role in helping citizens keep their yards up.

I've noticed that Code enforcement has visited my neighbor at least once to force him to finally remove the tree that had fallen on his roof and was creating an unsafe condition. I really wish they'd taken the extra step of walking around the property to inspect the huge fire hazard that is his overgrown and untended yard. I realize the Royal Lane subdivision is a private road, but I worry that his yard represents a danger to every home around him, even those that are city property instead of private, because of a lightning strike or errant firework. I end up looking over at the place with an awful feeling every 4th and 24th of July, or Monsoon season because of this. Also, my neighbor to the West seems to be building more and more unlicensed structures for his growing farm animal collection without any real oversight. Did we completely remove the planning and code enforcement departments in a budget cut?

The City Engineer was Responsive when I asked about speeding on my small 25 mile an hour Street high grasses along Wasatch Boulevard - please keep them trimmed down re fire danger. Thank you.

I have had excellent co-operation from the code enforcement department

I have worked with John Lovato with ordinance enforcement and found him to be absolutely superb in handling residential neighborhood problems. He confronts problems immediately and effectively.

CH is the only city I have ever lived in that provides street cleaning and ordinance enforcement. I hope the snow removal is better next year, especially in the cul-de-sacs. Speaking of cul-de-sacs, a few years ago I watched the SL County snow plow operator pull the snow from in front of the driveways and push it to the two areas of the circle without driveways-----I even called the county to see if we could get him permanently. Can we get him back?

I had emergency officers come for a heart problem I had and they were professional and wonderful getting me to the hospital. Also for over grown and junk houses, the professionals came to them to warn them to cut down their bushes and lawns and clean up the places. Very good job!

Experienced police services first hand. Excellent. Code enforcement of my neighbors. Great experience.

There are way too many cats roaming around the streets and back yards. Snow plowing could really be improved. Code enforcement to maintain quiet residential area is most appreciated. Question why destroy buildings rather than make them alternative use (butler school)?

Code Enforcement Negative

I have contacted City Hall twice in the last year. Both times the personnel were articulate and professional, and they resolved my issues with one call. I think your city code enforcement needs some additional work to do. Getting a notice that my grass was over 6 inches high after I returned from vacation was a complete waste of time.

Get rid of the 25 mph speed limit going up 3000 E to 7000 S! Change to 40 mph as it exists going down the street. Add some ordinances to make people keep their yards nice to stop Urban Blight along main streets and neighborhoods!

Code enforcement of rundown properties and renting out houses to multiple non family members is a problem. Animal control of herds of deer may or may not be the city's responsibility.

need stricter code enforcement of unleashed animals. need more planning control of developments close to the canyons

need more people to clean up their properties better and have better watch o n criminal activity

After hours construction noise violations are a big problem to me. The code enforcement and police have tried to be helpful but violations are flagrant and repetitive and apparently without consequence. I have written to Mike Shelton about my area and how people in the neighborhood do not make their homes look nice. They don't water their lawns or mow them and old cars setting in the front yard in other words I would like to see some type of enforcement to have people have pride in the neighborhood.

The city chooses NOT to enforce code for weeds, abandoned yards, junker cars in yards, and quality of living, pride of ownership by homeowners.

I love dogs, but our parks should not be off leash areas.....code enforcement or animal control needs to be more diligent

I called last year to express concern regarding homes that have high weeds, cars on blocks, etc. I was told not much could be done. I know a few homes were given notices, but no noticable change has been made.

I have always had good response from any services I have inquired about. I wish there was something to do about abandoned houses and declining rental property in my neighborhood.

We have had someone harass multiple people on our block with city ordnance complaints about messy yards. when the officer comes they say that our yard is fine but we still have to go through the whole bureaucratic process of having them inspect our property before telling us that there was no problem. This has been happening for years and we want the harassment of us and our neighbors to stop.

The dissatisfaction i have with code and animal control enforcement is the over use of the officer trolling neighborhoods and being terrible about giving out notices and saying a neighbor complained when it was an officer being a jerk and giving citations for people having a zero landscape which helps the environment while real estate dealers are allowed to have their empty lots with 4 ft grass just waiting for another huge grass fire

The Cottonwood Heights website should report illegal activities that occur within our city on a monthly basis. Our citizens need to be informed of what is happening in our community. The charts that the website does provide are 6 months behind and fail to give enough information. My neighborhood continues to have numerous vehicles parked on the street for days at a time (again against zoning and city rules).

Enforce dog licensing and leash laws.

I've noticed that Code enforcement has visited my neighbor at least once to force him to finally remove the tree that had fallen on his roof and was creating an unsafe condition. I really wish they'd taken the extra step of walking around the property to inspect the huge fire hazard that is his overgrown and untended yard. I realize the Royal Lane subdivision is a private road, but I worry that his yard represents a danger to every home around him, even those that are city property instead of private, because of a lightning strike or errant firework. I end up looking over at the place with an awful feeling every 4th and 24th of July, or Monsoon season because of this. Also, my neighbor to the West seems to be building more and more unlicensed structures for his growing farm animal collection without any real oversight. Did we completely remove the planning and code enforcement departments in a budget cut?

Snow removal seems to be a pressing issue. pot hole repair appears to be inadequate. Front yard ordinance enforcement seems to be lacking. Many neighborhoods seem to look like the ghetto. Barking dogs appears to go unnoticed and allowed. I don't feel as safe in my own home as I did years ago. I realize times have changed. I just hate that we seem to have so much crime. I wish there was some type of program for more street lights. My husband and I are happy in our area and have lived here for over 35 years. We are not moving. I also don't want to seem like I am complaining. I am sure the city leaders do the best they can with the funds they have to work with.

Introduce green waste at no charge. Investigate the mayor's office. Repave all roads with the nice asphalt used in the better neighborhoods like Top of the World. our street always gets the crappy surface. Grind out the ever-thicker crap and pave with the good asphalt. More bike paths everywhere. Enforce sidewalk shoveling laws. I use sidewalks all the time on Fort Union Blvd. the worst offender in the Sinclair station at 30th East. I end up walking in the road on icy days because they never shovel their sidewalks.

Personally we had really good snow removal, much better than when the county was doing it. I think the code enforcement needs work, too many parked cars, boats, and RV's that only move a few times a year. We need more incentives for conservation ie. xeriscaping, solar panel rebates, etc

The road maintenance is a joke. There are potholes and deteriorating roadways everywhere except for the main arteries. The preventative maintenance is seem to be nonexistent. There doesn't appear to be any self initiated by the city. It only acts on complaints.

The code enforcement over steps.

There was an incident where he entered a house without consent from the home owner in our neighborhood because he saw a repair vehicle parked in front of the house.

Every city vehicle should be capable of noting on an app where there are bad roads. There should be proactive maintenance without the overwhelming need for complaints. I notice we make the bus stops look nice and we spend the money to water the plants at the ones in our area. WASTE of Tax dollars.

I think the police should do a better job of enforcing traffic laws. I live by the inersction of highland and Bengal. The number of vehicles running the red light is horrifying. I think traffic laws are not enforced.

I did not like the article in the Cottonwood Heights newsletter regarding stray animals i.e. cats. It is disgusting how many cats our neighborhood has and you can watch them stalking birds. I think there should be stricter rules for roaming cats.

There is no enforcement of zoning in our neighborhood there is a single dwelling with 4 families. They have so many cars they are parked on the lawn.

Snow removal is awful compared to when county did it. I hope it now improves. Police are terrific. They don't get enough credit. Council does well with budgeting. Wish codes for property upkeep were stronger.

We nave lived in our home over 52 years, services come and go. Our taxes are two times the amount our entire house payments were. The streets and gutters are falling apart, neighborhood as you enter off fort union makes us all look bad.

Snow removal company is poor. Zoning, and overall improvement of neighborhoods and keeping homeowners accountable for maintenance of lawn and ordinances is poor. It's a really ugly city frankly

I think cops have gotten better, but often it seems like they feel the need to enforce their dominance, although it's gotten much better in the past 5 years.

I would love to see some empty property made to look more visually appealing, similar to what happened across the street from Brighton high school. Just areas that have just weeds growing made to look a bit prettier.

Snow removal was sub par, I hope the city taking it over is a big improvement. We have a neighbor that had had to deal with trying to get permits to build some houses and has had a lot of run around and silly hoops to jump through to be able to get permits and such. We have also had the police visit our neighbors several times for noise complaints by some neighbors who will complain about everything. The police are not usually very nice about it and the ones filling the complaints are the real nuisances.

Former snow plow company really damaged streets and did a very poor job of snow removal compared to the county.

Animal services will not go out on non-emergency calls when an animal has been left outside constantly barking in distress for days and days.

Appears to be no enforcement of leash laws as there are constantly unleashed dogs in the neighborhoods.

Cottonwood Heights Rec Center is a fantastic facility, though would appreciate more long course lap swimming time.

Overspending on police services - how many motorcycles and UTVs does a small department need? Overspending on what appears to be toys (new firearms, etc) for the personal enjoyment of the police department.

Parks and Open Spaces Positive

Parks and Open Spaces Negative

I lived in Cottonwood Heights before it was incorporated as a city. Nothing has changed for me except taxes have gone up and you are building a glorious

The tennis courts at Antczak Park were resurfaced a few years ago. Now they are seriously deteriorated again because 1- a poor job was done at the outset, and/or 2- surface defects have not been repaired (i.e., cracks can be repaired), and/or 3- the city chose to do a cheap job rather than spend more for a proper job. Now, the best course of action would likely be to repair the cracks (but do it properly); if the cracks are not repaired as they occur, the problem will get worse each year owing to freeze - thaw cycles..

Planning, Zoning, and Building Services Positive

I have received excellent information from Glen Gullens in the planning dept.

My interaction with the planning and zoning people as been very positive. There are some aspects of the zoning ordinances (for example, the "average" height of new residences) that could use some serious reconsideration because they are very ambiguous and can be leveraged to the disadvantage of existing homeowners.

I am a general contractor and would rate the Cottonwood Heights Building Department as the best in the valley. Very easy to work with and extremely accommodating with information and inspection needs.

Planning, Zoning, and Building Services Negative

Since there was already a large tract of empty space on the S.E corner of 23rd E. and 70th So. that seemed like a better location. Putting the offices, (Police Dept.) across from the H.S., really? Getting up Bengal Blvd. in bad weather is a disaster waiting to happen.

there are way too many duplexes in CH...at least in my neighborhood...

don't know that the expenditure on the new city building was necessary

I was impressed with the effort that went into the mobile Emergency Operation Center during the ShakeOut in Cottonwood Heights. We stopped by the trailer where the EOC is housed and were given a brief tour. Likewise, we visited the Red Cross Shelter set up at the Rec Center, and the emergency animal services facility set up at the church on Bengal Blvd. Nice effort by everyone.

Emergency Preparedness Negative

Never received advertised ribbons/flags for the Great Utah Shakeout, even after calling to request them. The Races down Big Cottonwood Canyon Road are a problem- Isn't there a better route? Maybe bikers need more dedicated bike lanes, as they don't share the road with automobiles, nor do they share the trails with walkers. I have seen many bikers riding 2-4 abreast, with very poor levels of concern for their own safety, or the safety of others. They need to be policed!

We need less animal and park regulation and much less police presense. We do need better snow and road maintainance. Emergency training (or whatever it was) was wrong, please, do not do it again.

Fire and Emergency Medical Positive

We have only been here 1.5 years. We had a call with the fire department and they were great. The rec center is awesome. The police presence seems very



good. I dealt with the building department and they were very helpful. We really enjoy living in this community

We have needed emergency services a few times and we have been very happy with the prompt response to our needs. This was not in the last year but I feel comfortable knowing they are there!!

Outstanding fire and police services

I had emergency officers come for a heart problem I had and they were professional and wonderful getting me to the hospital. Also for over grown and junk houses, the professionals came to them to warn them to cut down their bushes and lawns and clean up the places. Very good job!

Paramedics got to my house in record time on March 23rd and assisted my daughter in taking me to the Intermountain Medical Center. They noticed an open window in my basement and came through that window instead of breaking down my front door. They were polite, kind, and helped me get medical treatment in record time. I commend them. We had an autistic granddaughter get angry and go out of control and the police came. They not only settled her down, but helped her resolve her problem. I have never seen police treat children this kind before and yet be stern enough to let her know they would be back if it happened again. It hasn't happened again and we attribute this to the way they handled the situation. The child's mother was grateful also. Any training that police and fire officials can take on how to deal with AUTISM would be productive and prudent. These children don't act like other children and if you don't know how to deal with autistic children, you can make the situation worse. There are many places for officers to gain training on this problem. But the two officers responding to our granddaughter were obviously in tune with children with autism and they did a stellar job of getting the problem solved.

the unified fire were called on an emergency they were very fast in coming and handled the situation with care compassion and professionalism. They receive an A+ from me

I think that the paramedics are incredible.

While this did not occur within the past year, my family had an extremely good experience with emergency services. Their performance and behavior was exemplary.

I fell and broke my leg on June first. I called 911 and the EMT response time was just over 5 minutes. I was very impressed however the resulting bill somewhat dampened my enthusiasm. After all, I've been paying pretty hefty property tax for four decades. Cudos to the crew that responded to my injury in spite of my grouching.

Great appreciation for the Fire and Police Departments for the services they provide to the residents of the City.

The cost for water service is very high, just to maintain the landscaping around my property.

I do want to note that it is reassuring to have the fire department close and local to my residence.

Get rid of the big 26? mile marathon that closes main thoroughfares and leaves residents trapped in areas that "lead to nowhere". Also, surveys have been done regarding traffic flow through residential streets, with no outcome in at least one particular case. Why can't citizens count on better communication with/from Council members? It's extremely difficult to understand no action and no communication when we see the very things our survey suggested applied elsewhere - sometimes only a subdivision over. But to our police, emergency and fire depts, we offer our greatest thanks and praise.

The police force is arrogant and rude. If you are in an accident and it's not even your fault they treated you like scum. They have a mighty than thou attitude. They should take some customer service lessons from the fireman and paramedics who are polite and know the job

Police officers responded quickly to a break in at my business this month. Not much can evidently be done but I did receive a follow up call from an officer and gave him information about the path the criminal took. Not sure if they followed up on questions to the houses behind me where they jumped the fence. They did a good job, I think the system just can't do much with the leads.

I notice fire trucks and ambulances on different occasions turn on their lights and sirens specifically to get through the intersection at Ft. Union and Union Park avenue, and then turn them off as they entered the freeway or other direction they were going. It diminishes faith in the service to see them abuse their privilege in this way.

Too many cops. They have nothing better to do than harass high school students and people walking their dogs. Fire them. We need enough cops to stop crime, not harass citizens. We need better response times to emergencies. I was there the day the kid drowned in the rec center pool. It took 20 minutes for the paramedics to arrive, and then they WALKED to the kid! There can be no excuse for this.

Finally, as for park maintenance, we need the county, the rec center, and the school district to get together on the maintenance for Butler Park. They mow on different days and have different watering schedules for the various parts of the lawn. Really? And in the winter nobody will accept responsibility for clearing the sidewalk through the park so kids can walk to school. This is just an example of finger-pointing, and it's embarrassing to watch.

The bins for big trash removal are good, but get filled quickly. Can you add more?

It would be nice if the garbage removal came in the morning instead of in the middle of the day when the little ones are sleeping. :)

Green waste cans are emptied about 50% of the time. Sanitation has asked if can could be emptied the following week. In response to their question I asked if they were going to reduce my bill. I was instructed to leave my can on the curb- it has sat there til the following week on occasion.... Other times it's taken several days for to get emptied .

Garbage: Many cities in Utah and across the county offer more frequent curbside garbage pick-up for unwanted items. We have only the one 24 hour period per year to get things into a dumpster that may be placed at the end of the block several houses away or when you happen to be on vacation. Culinary Water Positive

A break in a large water pipe in our circle and a subsequent electrical malfunction were repaired very adequately. (both were big jobs).

I communicated with the mayor concerning water problems. He responded promptly & the problem has been resolved as we speak.

I think the city did a tremendous job, after a water main burst in front of our house, of fixing the leak, replacing the sidewalk and resodding the lawn.

I am very pleased with the garbage services as they noticed we had some extra yard trash and came back around to get more of it. Also, the water services came out and let us know we might have a leak and we found a leaky sprinkler.

The water supply line broke at the end of E. Summer Oaks Cir. late fall of 2015. Repairs began immediately and service restored promptly. A 40 foot hole was excavated for the repairs and following completion of said repairs a barricade set in place on the perimeter. Some basic clean up was made in the following week but the excavated hole was left unattended and remained so till late spring 2016. It wasn't until local residence call the city office to complain. It took a week to get the hole filled in and paved over and even then clean up was minimal leaving at least 2-3 cubic yards of debris at the curb. There were no pass downs between the AM and PM shifts causing delays and confusion. Tempo of work by members on site could not have been slower. My teenage sons could complete this job in the half the time your so called professionals. 6 months to complete this job that should have taken at most a week for a typical dysfunctional bureaucracy or 3 days for an efficient functioning private sector business. Because you decided to subcontract out repairs to private companies puts city management ultimately responsibility that work is being done at a satisfactory level and within a reasonable time frame. I don't expect work to be done at the level of quality and time one would expect from a well managed private company but by inefficient city bureaucracy standards this is well short of acceptable. Was there a project manager among city managers to monitor the quality of work and time to completion? Why was there not a letter sent to the local residence effected stating when the work would be completed?

Culinary Water Negative

The cost for water service is very high, just to maintain the landscaping around my property.

I do want to note that it is reassuring to have the fire department close and local to my residence.

We are having a problem with our water pressure being too high. I can't find anyone to help us address the problem, as it is costing us a lot of money replacing valves in our home and on our sprinklers because the pressure causes them to prematurely fail.

Sometimes our water tastes like it's coming out of a swimming pool.

I had to repair my waterline in 2011 from the main to the house. Unfortunately at that time there was no insurance to repair it as there is now. I know the county covers the line coming from the street to the homeowners main but not from the main to the home. I paid plenty to repair it.

It has been going on two weeks that we have been waiting for a water brake in the middle of our street to be finished repairing . This is the third brake in the last few years. instead of replacing the whole pipes on our short street they keep piece meal it.

It would be nice not to have to use drinking water to water our lawns. It is very expensive to use in that way. My sister in Draper doesn't have to use drinking water to water their lawns, as there is another source, and it saves them money.

We had an issue with the public water line freezing in the street directly outside our property. Salt Lake City was responsive at temporarily fixing the problem but the line remains higher than frost depth and no measures have been taken to completely fix the problem from happening next winter. We were told to leave a trickle of water running at night while on vacation or during cold nights which seems irresponsible in a desert.

General Positive

I'm really impressed with our mayor. I have the perception that he really cares about people. I know that he is available by phone, b/c friends have told me he's answered when they call his cell. But one neighbor told me, "The mayor has personally made a lot of money on that development at the mouth of Big Cottonwood Canyon." Taxes are getting to high for retirees

We live on a private lane and a lot of the services you offer are not available to us and we still pay a high rate in taxes.

Put term limits on the Politicians

Better education of recycling items: TV's, glass drop off locations, baby car seats, better use of recycling containers and encouragement of their use. Traffic control:i.e. blinking yellow lights at some intersections for left turns. (Highland Drive and Bengal Blvd. coming from the south.) This would reduce idling problems. More timely light changes at intersections. (7200 and Highland Drive and 1700 East and Fort Union.) Acknowledgement to citizens for their comments when shared.

Never received advertised ribbons/flags for the Great Utah Shakeout, even after calling to request them. The Races down Big Cottonwood Canyon Road are a problem- Isn't there a better route? Maybe bikers need more dedicated bike lanes, as they don't share the road with automobiles, nor do they share the trails with walkers. I have seen many bikers riding 2-4 abreast, with very poor levels of concern for their own safety, or the safety of others. They need to be policed!

Get rid of the big 26? mile marathon that closes main thoroughfares and leaves residents trapped in areas that "lead to nowhere". Also, surveys have been done regarding traffic flow through residential streets, with no outcome in at least one particular case. Why can't citizens count on better communication with/from Council members? It's extremely difficult to understand no action and no communication when we see the very things our survey suggested applied elsewhere - sometimes only a subdivision over. But to our police, emergency and fire depts, we offer our greatest thanks and praise.

Something needs to be done about the speeding on Nantucket drive. Having an officer stop and holler out the window that my dog needs to be on a leash when he is walking right beside me is a tad ridiculous. Weeds all over the city and in this neighborhood are atrocious. People are not keeping their property maintained in a good way. Fences are falling down, cars are parked on the grass of a house, an old car has been parked next to a house for over a year, sidewalks in the neighborhood are heaved up 6 to 8 inches in places. No recycling of glass and then there is to be an additional charge is far behind most other cities. Property tax assessments seem to have no basis in consistency when my house is assessed based on selling price and the house across the street had over \$100,000 in remodeling done and they pay less than I do. The fact that most city/county/state offices are held by republicans is appalling.

re-modeling permit was limited by the availability of inspectors. Securing the permit was limited by the number of persons available to review the plans and grant the permit

Trying to rent the pavilion from the rec center was a very bad disorganized disheveled experience

called utility people about schedule for neighborhodd cleanup bins. Told that was another entity. Had to look up myself.

sidewalks not fixed on Sundown Avenue, also on 6/22 I called 911 to report accident on I215 eastbound and was put on HOLD

When your neighbors house is a fire hazard and a visible eye sore from the street, we shouldn't have to call. Mattresses and couches are not lawn decorations.

As mentioned before, I had several times during off office hours that I needed help dealing with a police or code issue (dogs at large, intruders, campers on our street) where I was unable to get assistance. We need a better response for after hours issues.

I was never able to reach the right person.

We have street lights that are constantly going out. The city makes excuses and they take forever to fix them. We need them for our safety!!!

a water main break on 23rd East caused traffic to be routed down my street and needed to be slowed down prior to the kids coming home. It took a while to reach a person but the City Manager got the job done. Eventually.

I called about our street having potholes and they finally came out yesterday to repair those but like I said before the sidewalks need to be taken care of soon

On the particular issue where I had a concern, the response time was several weeks. I was not impressed at all!!!

I have contacted the city multiple times since we moved to Cottonwood Heights in 2009 regarding the standing water in our gutters because of the poor drainage design and the crumbling streets by the gutter. Nothing has been done to improve the gutter drainage issue from our side of the street.

Seem to be having a rat problem in our neighborhood & don't know what to do. Didn't get any response from animal control as to what steps we could take.

I gave the police department my son's cell phone full of info on drugs being sold at the skate park. Absolutely nothing came of it! It has names, meeting places and numbers!

I can't take my little one to the skate park because the rules on language are constantly violated and the older people (the creepy dudes that hang out with the teens) take over the ramps! There are inconsistent times for the lights to go out and the gates to be locked and no attempt to kick people out based on legal curfew time. There needs to be a consistent police presence there. With the outrageous amount of officers on our force this shouldn't be a problem!

Water in gutters floods my basement and city will not alter gutter or drain.

This happened a little over a year ago, but I found a Pit Bull wandering the neighborhood and called animal services. There was no one available to help because of the weekend, I was told to either just keep the dog in my yard or turn him loose again. I could not, in good conscience, turn the dog loose. I spent half the day looking for and eventually found his owner.

When I called on street curb cracking and how awful, I was told that it was too bad but there is no funding to repair and we are not even close on the list to replace. I had been told by a neighbor it would be replaced/fixed summer 2016.

During the sewer line replacement we had a complaint and no one wanted to help fix the road where it wasn't correctly fixed. Poor asphalt and it was breaking up. Just again, no service

Same old story every year....no money for sidewalks, curb and gutter

I previously vented about my dissatisfaction regarding trying to get remodel permits.

I agree that a lot more can be done with higher property taxes but being on a fixed income creates a problem when expenses increased.

There was a question, "In order for Cottonwood Heights to continue to provide the same level of city services, would you rather see the city increase commercial development to generate more city revenue, or increase property taxes to generate more revenue? a) Increased development, b) Increased property taxes" This is a loaded question. I do not understand how tax revenues continue to go up yet our spending increases more. Revenues have gone up because values have go up, as well as rates. So, more and more revenue even if we did not have population growth. The only answer is that we are not spending in a smart way. SOMething is not right... the original proposal to incorporate touted the savings it would bring since our established tax revenue would stay local instead of being spread around SL county. Obviously, more + more = more here and that's not the promise that was made. Our city's finances are being mismanaged.

I'd strongly support a more walkable city but now that I'm gimpy I'm pretty much confined to motor transportation.

The city betrayed its incompetence by commissioning the most hideous city building in the valley. The inconvenienced, traumatized, and economically affected the residents around it. Next, they want to remove the traffic lights and install a European style round about next to Brighton High School. That will only put at risk all of the children that cross either Bengal or 20th East. They have to spend money... Who say? A roundabout is a trendy, inconvenient, waste of money. I would like to see sidewalk access from the Prospector Hill Neighborhood to the Big Cottonwood Bike path. I'd like to learn more about the development plan for the gravel pit (the air quality from the dust can get pretty bad from the gravel pit).

The 2 questions about raising revenue were tainted. Its either raise taxes or increase development. I don't think the city has done a good job with the money that has been given to them. So to increase taxes without feeling like we're already getting our money's worth is not a good question. Also It depends on the development and where it is located. The question about creating a hub for transit using Fort Union, and development needs to address



that there are homes in this area and that development needs to take that into account. If the development involves HIGH DENSITY housing like the presidents master plan. I live in Cottonwood Heights because of single family housing.
